At mothers2mothers, we focus on delivering health, hope, and an HIV-free future. This work starts with ending HIV—preventing mother-to-child transmission of HIV and stopping new infections in their tracks, using our lifecycle approach.

OUR SCALE AND REACH CONTINUES TO GROW

IN 2019:


We enrolled

932,431

new clients, an **increase of 4% from 2018**.

This included over 30,000 clients enrolled through technical assistance support to governments and other Non-Governmental Organisations (NGOs).

Our prevention of mother-to-child transmission project in Eswatini ended in mid-2019, and we started new country programmes in **Angola and Ghana**.



Our strategic focus on creating an HIV-free generation is reflected in our shifting client composition:



OUR WORK TO ENSURE A NEW GENERATION IS BORN HIV-FREE CONTINUES TO BE A REMARKABLE SUCCESS

For the **sixth year in a row**, we have **achieved virtual elimination** of mother-to-child transmission of HIV for our enrolled clients.



- UN benchmark for virtual elimination of HIV is < 5%
- MTCT rate among enrolled m2m clients

We recorded a rate of **1.9% in 2019**; a slight increase from 2018 (1.3%), but not a statistically significant difference.

WE CONTINUE TO DO AN EXCELLENT JOB AT KEEPING
OUR HIV-NEGATIVE CLIENTS HIV-FREE



Only **0.08%** of m2m's HIV-negative pregnant or breastfeeding mothers newly-acquired HIV in 2019.



This is **45 times lower** than the 2020 rate across sub-Saharan Africa (3.6%).²



OUR PEER MENTORS ARE DRIVING AND REINFORCING BEHAVIOURS
AND ACTIONS THAT CREATE OUR SUCCESS IN PREVENTING NEW
ADULT AND CHILDHOOD INFECTIONS

In 2019, key quality indicators demonstrated the consistent or improved performance of our Model. For example:



97%

of infants born to mothers living with HIV received antiretroviral medication, **significantly up from 90%** in 2018.



84%

of children born to mothers living with HIV received a **final HIV test** between 18-24 months, a **significant increase from 75%** in 2018.



95%

of our clients reported consistent condom use, **up significantly from 68%** in 2018.



1. This analysis was performed using data generated by m2m. The reach and scale analyses includes all countries where m2m implemented programmes in 2019 (i.e., Eswatini, Kenya, Lesotho, Malawi, Mozambique, South Africa, Uganda, and Zambia). Outcome analysis was based on sites utilising digital health systems and sufficient digital health data (Eswatini, for primary prevention analysis; Lesotho, South Africa, and Uganda).
